




In the Beginning











First DRA Meeting September 26, 1926 – Bozeman Montana – Organized by Northern Pacific Railroad

"Dude Ranching as a business has grown from a boarding house proposition with an occasional summer visitor into an industry that has brought revenue of One Million Dollars to Montana".

Railroad Executives and Resort owners from Idaho, Montana and Wyoming attended about 100 men and women.

Purpose of Meeting:

- To establish co-operation and acquaintance with railroads and resort owners (Dude Ranches)
- How to get guest and take care of them.
- Establish a publicity and advertising plans for the association
- To standardize practices Pricing and Cancellations.
- To form an efficient sales organization.





At the first DRA meeting it was discussed that "Dude Ranching" and the term "Dudes" was undignified and that another name for the association should be chosen.

Richard Randall from the OTO Ranch told the gathering that the name "Dude" originated in the Yellowstone National Park back in 1886, when he drove stage for the visitors in the Park. Because people were now educated to the familiar term Dude Ranching, and it is a trademark of inestimable value to the industry and that people liked it. So instead of Guest Resorts Association the group voted unanimously to keep it as Dude Ranchers Association.


Traditional Dude Ranch
